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#### MESSAGE FROM THE DEAN

The program was designed to capture the attention of the Deans and address some of the most important issues facing post-secondary education today.

Keynote speakers included Alex Usher, President, Higher Education Strategies Inc.; Barbara Pike, Vice-President, AIMS (Atlantic Institute for Market Studies); Dr. Noreen Golfman, FEDCAN; and Brent Herbert-Copley, Vice President, SSHRC. The Honourable Shawn Murphy moderated a session between Dr. Golfman and Wade MacLauchlan, entitled *Ongoing and Oncoming Fiscal Challenges for Canadian Universities*.

We also had the good fortune of having UPEI's new Vice-President speak in a plenary session on the *Future of Universities*. Dr. James Randall is currently a professor of geography and planning at UNBC. Dalhousie University Medical Students recently joined musicians from the University of Prince Edward Island on Saturday, April 10 in a gala concert at the Dr. Steel Recital Hall.

#### Military Conference

The University of Prince Edward Island, The Gregg Centre for the Study of War and Society at UNB, HMCS Queen Charlotte and the Prince Edward Island Regiment hosted the first annual Atlantic Military Affairs Symposium in Charlottetown, April 16-17. Local soldiers, sailors, and aircrew formed the core of this public military history and current affairs gathering to focus on the Island's role in the defence of Canada. The keynote address at UPEI on April 16 was delivered by renowned Canadian naval historian, Professor Roger Sarty from Wilfrid Laurier University. In honour of Canada's Naval Centennial, his presentation was titled, "By accident as much as by design: The surprising origins and rise of the Royal Canadian Navy, 1881-1945."

On April 17, local and national military historians presented on subjects ranging from the Island's 19<sup>th</sup> Century militia and contribution in two world wars, to the role of today's PEI army and naval reservists around the world. The featured speakers included The Gregg Centre's Lee Windsor and Brent Wilson, PEI historians **Boyde Beck** and **David Campbell**, and reservists from HMCS Queen Charlotte and the Prince Edward Island Regiment who have returned from service overseas. **Dr. Bruce Craig** was an integral leader in making this conference a success. We are optimistic that this collaborative partnership will become an annual event.

## OUR FACULTY

2010 Education Research Forum: Research With/in Communities hosted by the Centre for Education Research (CER) was held recently at the Rodd Royalty Hotel, Charlottetown. The Faculty of Arts was highly represented in this conference. Presenters included: Dr. Annabel Cohen, Dr. Jean Mitchell, Dr. Godfrey Baldacchino, Dr. June Countryman, and Professor Janice McKendrick.

Nancy MacIntosh, a Sessional Instructor in the English Department, will be traveling to Winchester, England to do a poster presentation called "Caring: a multiliteracy". The conference is hosted by the United Kingdom Literacies Association. She is very happy to be attending and presenting at this conference.

# Research on Tap: a series of public discussions with UPEI researchers.

Research on Tap is an opportunity for the public to interact with our researchers in a comfortable environment. In December, **Dr. Joe Velaidum**, Chair of the Department of Religious Studies and Director of the Centre for Christianity and Culture, launched the series with a talk entitled "Same old arguments of the new atheism movement." Following Dr. Velaidum's presentation, the floor was opened for discussion to anyone who wanted to participate.

In January, **Dr. Ed MacDonald**, Acting Chair of the Department of History, discussed "Package Deals: Exploring the History of Tourism on PEI". In February, just in time for Valentine's Day, **Dr. Stacey L. MacKinnon**, Assistant Professor, Department of Psychology held a discussion about relationships, trust, and revenge. In March **Dr. Michael Shaver**, an assistant professor of chemistry who focuses on "green" chemistry, defended both the honour of his profession, and the much-maligned so-called enemy of the environment with his talk entitled "Good Plastics: why chemists have a bad name and what we're doing about it". In April, **Dr. Jennifer Taylor** of Family and Nutritional Sciences discussed "Fries with that? Are school nutrition policies the solution to childhood obesity?" Taylor discussed nutrition policies in Island schools, including ones that categorize food based on their nutritional value.

Edward Chung (Religious Studies) presented two international conference papers (invited): "Sagehood and Religious Practice in Yi T'oegye's Neo-Confucianism" at the 22<sup>nd</sup> International Conference on T'oegye Studies. The International T'oegyehak Society and Youngnam Institute of T'oegye Studies, Youngnam University, South Korea, Aug. 29-31, 2009 (23 pages total); and "The Religious Thought of Yi T'oegye (1501-70): A Neo-Confucian and Comparative Perspective" at the 2<sup>nd</sup> International Conference on East Asian Confucianisms: Interactions and Innovations. The Confucius Institute and Rutgers University (The State University of New Jersey), April 30-May 1, 2009 (17 pages).

Dr. Chung also published two articles: "Daesoon Religious Thought: A Confucian and Comparative Interpretation," The Academic Journal of Daesoonjinri, vol. 3 (2010), 22 pages, The Daesoon Research Institute; and "Sagehood and Religious Practice in Yi T'oegye's Neo-Confucianism: A Korean and Global Perspective", a revised conference paper in The Literature and Thought of Yi T'oegye: Proceedings of the 22nd International T'oegye Studies Conference, pp. 263-291, The International T'oegyehak Society and the Youngnam Institute of T'oegye Studies, 2009.
