



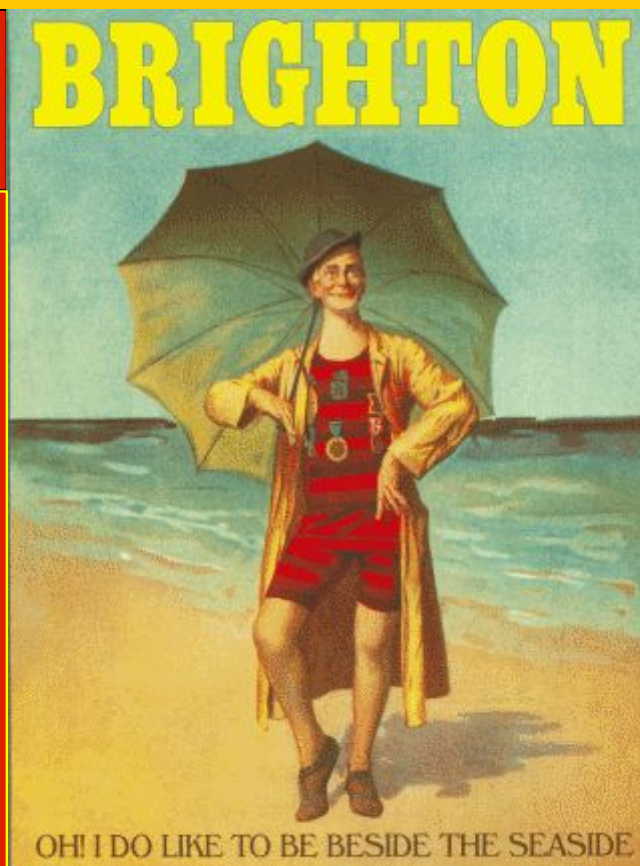

Tourism and
Western
Society:
The Travel
Imperative



Travel for pleasure is almost as old as Western civilization. This course provides an historical overview of the evolution of tourism with special emphasis on the Western world, beginning with the medieval passion for pilgrimage through the Enlightenment Grand Tour to the birth of the modern tourist trade, one of the world's fastest growing industries. A series of case studies are used to pursue specific topics, such as the economics of tourism, motivation for travel, the rise of the resort, the transportation revolution, promotion and imaging, and the social and cultural impacts of tourism on host societies.



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This course explores the political, social, economic, diplomatic, and cultural history of Russia since the reign of Peter the Great. It covers topics such as Russia's rise as a European power in the 18th and 19th centuries, the development of Russian autocracy, the revolutions of 1905 and 1917, the history of the Soviet Union under Lenin and Stalin, the nationalities question, the collapse of communism, and Russia since Gorbachev.

In a nation so vast as Canada, why is Prince Edward Island, a place small enough to fit inside Anticosti Island, with a population small enough to be swallowed up in a Toronto suburb, a province? In tracing the development of Prince Edward Island from its beginning in layers of sediment washed off ancient mountains to its reluctant entry into Confederation in 1873, this course will address questions of seeing and being and identity, including that elusive characteristic, “islandness.”

The History of U.S.-Latin American Relations

This course will critically examine how the United States' varying levels of imperial and hegemonic control affected its political, economic, social, and cultural relationships with the republics of Latin America. Throughout the course, attention will be paid to imperial theories, anti-imperial responses, military interventions, political revolutions, economic investment, immigration, drug trafficking, as well as the construction of racial and gender ideologies that continue to influence U.S.-Latin American relations in the twenty-first century.
