




Inter-provincial employees in Canada, 2002-2011





Inter-provincial employees in Alberta 2002-2011




Number of inter-provincial employees in Alberta by province or territory of residence, 2002-2011



Inter-provincial employees in Alberta as percentage of total local labour force (15yrs +)




Age composition of inter-provincial employees in Alberta 2002-2011





Alberta in-migrants and inter-provincial employees 2002-2011





Dear Ministers Kent and Oliver:

We are writing to you today on behalf of the Energy Framework Initiative (EFI) which represents Canada's energy sector value chain. The purpose of our letter is to express our shared views on the near-term opportunities before the Government to address regulatory reform for major energy industries in Canada. The objective of regulatory reform is very clear: to enable economic growth and job creation while continuing to ensure responsible environmental and social outcomes.

Throughout the world today, governments are facing the need for fiscal restraint and careful allocation and management of scarce human and financial resources. The focus is increasingly on job creation and economic health. Canada is in a more favourable position than many countries, in part because the government has chosen to proceed prudently to ensure our economic recovery, and in part because natural resource industries – like Canada's energy sector - have sustained the

"I thought it would be all young fellows...
the truth was, there was more middle-aged
fellows than anybody. And they were all
there for the same reason: they *all* needed
to make the money."

"There's no money to be made [in PEI]! Who's going to go work for ten dollars an hour? You can't! You just can't. It's impossible.... I tried to stay away from [the oil patch] as much as I could.

"You're just like a cow: getting off the plane, they funnel you towards a bus, you get on the bus, they take you to a place, you're given your card, you go to your room. And you're at work the next day, like a good cow."

"They call it "Wapatraz" because it's like a jail.... It's totally dry, so no drinking. You can't leave and come back without going through a security gate. They can check your belongings at any time: your room, your car, whatever... It's just f-in' eat and sleep."

"Oh, you just get into a mindset. When you're away from home your mindset is: 'I'm not home with my family; I might as well just work'.... I don't mind at all. Again, I'm away from home, so you can work ten hours and, do what? Go to your room? You know, your room is the size of a big closet.... I could have asked for time off but, you know, I was here working, so that's all I wanted to do."

"Oh yeah, there'll be work next week." Well, four days later he calls, 'No, it got delayed, it got cancelled.' So it'll be another two weeks. Two weeks later, 'Oh, it's still delayed.' And then, the last time I went out to go work...I got as far as Toronto and he called me and told me the work got cancelled or delayed or whatever because of rain. So I had to turn around from Toronto and come back home.... 800 and some dollars later out of my own pocket."


